WILDFIRES

Southwest Florida saw a multitude of wildfires in March and April. At one point during the past month, three counties (Lee, Collier & Seminole) fought wildfires at the same time. The mutual aid between fire districts and help from the South Strike Team of brush trucks helped contain these fires as they threatened miles of land and nearby structures. The heavy responses to these wildfires also necessitated mutual aid between the counties' fire districts for all other emergency calls. A structure fire in San Carlos Park just miles from their wildfire was responded to by BSFD, South Trail and Iona.

WATER RESCUE

On March 13th, BSFD responded to a mutual aid MERT call with North Collier Fire District, Collier County Sheriff's Office and the Coast Guard. Responders successfully rescued all three occupants on board.

STRUCTURE FIRES

Brush wasn't the only thing burning this past month. Bonita firefighters were busy on the scenes of multiple structure fires as well. On March 15th, they responded to a local house fire. The fire was contained to one room and its contents; there were no injuries. On March 17th, BSFD was first on-scene to a structure fire at a home in San Carlos, while on standby during the nearby brush fire. On

March 30th, BSFD firefighters responded to a room-and-contents fire at a local nail salon. On April 7th, a structure fire on Hickory Boulevard shut down the two-lane road for hours while first responders used all resources to extinguish the fire.

VEHICLE VS STRUCTURE

On April 3rd, the Bonita Springs firefighters responded to an emergency involving a defective vehicle that crashed through the bottom of a stilt home, hitting another car before land-

ing in the home's swimming pool. The Special Operations Team secured the stilt home while the two vehicle occupants were treated with minor injuries and their dog was rescued from the submerged backseat.

WILDFIRE SAFETY



In Florida, each season poses a different danger! Southwest Florida can have wildfires year-round but generally, wildfire season peaks from January through June. Florida has already seen hundreds of wildfires in 2017, and on April 11th, Governor Rick Scott declared a state of emergency across the state because of it. Recent months have been especially dry in Southwest Florida, and with rising temperatures and still not enough rainfall, conditions remain inviting for brush fires.

Tips to stay safe during Wildfire Season

- 1. Preparation is key—have a PLAN! Create an evacuation plan and make sure all family members know and understand it. While at work, have a plan for children and pets that are home.
- 2. Know two evacuation routes out of your neighborhood. Have a predetermined place to meet your family. Firefighters and emergency personnel will go door-to-door to evacuate neighborhoods.
- 3. Create a Go-Kit! Supplies should include food/water, clothing, and important documents and other items, such as medications that you may need.
- 4. Maintain a Safety Zone. Be sure to have a functioning irrigation system around your home, and maintain fire-wise landscaping, keeping an area at least 30 feet around the structure that is clean and free of dead vegetation.
